The Rouge & Bleu have never lost to their opponents this evening, Orlen Wisla Plock. Raul Gonzalez's side have now won six of their last six games.

THE HOMETOWN CHILD

Kamil Syprzak will make an expected come back tonight in the Orlen Arena in Plock. The Parisian number 21 is indeed a hometown child. Born here 32 years ago now, Kamil was trained in the local club before spending six seasons there from 2009 to 2015 and winning the national title there in 2011. He then flew to FC Barcelona before to join Paris in 2019. In last season's double-header, Kamil scored a total of 15 goals in the Red and Blue's two victories.

NICE END OF GROUP PHASE

booked their place Having in the competition's final phase on the last week with a 29-28 victory over Porto, Wisla Plock rounded off a serious and successful group Ferran Solé (thigh), Yoann Gibelin (rehab) phase in the best possible way. The Poles began their European campaign with five Wallem Peleka, from the youth system of consecutive defeats and only two points from the club, made the trip. the first leg.

POLISH STRONG POINT

There is one area where the Polish team is leading this season in the EHF Champions League: goals scored from 7-metre, with 54 from 70 attempts. And Xavi Sabaté's players can also count on their goalkeepers, who are efficient in this category: 14 saves from penalties (3rd in the ranking).

MILESTONES BROTHERS

Karabatic brothers The are both approaching a new symbolic statistical line in European's elite. Nikola Karabatic, the eldest, can reach 1,200 goals in this competition. The number 44, who will retire at the end of the season, currently has 1,194. Luka Karabatic, meanwhile, can reach 300 goals in the competition (296).

THE OLDEST

The Polish team have the oldest player in the competition with left-back Mirsad Terzic. The Bosnian turned 40 last summer, followed by Timur Dibirov and... Nikola Karabatic, who will celebrate his new decade on April 11th.

Born in Manzanares (Castilla-La Mancha), Rubén made his handball debut with his hometown club in 2010. Two years later, he joined BM Cuidad Encantada to sign his first professional contract, before moving on to BM Benidorm (2015-2019) and then Ademar (2019-2021). In the summer of 2021, the Spanish international moved to France to play for HBC Nantes, before joining the French capital in the 2023 off-season. With La Roja, the Parisian scored 22 goals in 9

Luc Steins joins Paris at the end of November 2020 as a medical joker, following the injury of Nikola Karabatic. He made his professional first steps at the age of 17 with Limburg Lions, winning two Dutch Championship and Cup doubles in 2015 and 2016, before moving to Massy. Named best player of the Proligue in 2016-2017, Steins then signed for Tremblay-en-France, where he played for two seasons before moving to Toulouse in the summer of 2019. He was named MVP and best center-back in the Lidl Starlique in the 2020-2021 season. In two seasons

in the French capital, he achieved a "back-to-back-to-back" by being named MVP and best

Sadou Ntanzi joined the Paris Saint-Germain youth academy in 2017, before making his debut with the professional team in April 2019. Before starting the 2020-2021 season, the 20-year-old played 11 Lidl Star League matches and 5 Champions League matches, scoring a total of 13 goals. Named best centre-back in the 2018 European U18 Championship with 41 goals to his credit, Sadou Ntanzi signed his first professional contract in June 2020 and joined Toulouse on

Adama Keita is competing in his fifth professional season with Paris Saint-Germain. Emerging from the club's youth academy, the left-winger is the former captain and top scorer of the reserve team. Called up several times for the France youth teams, the Paris native won the bronze medal at the U21 World Championship in 2017, with Melvyn Richardson and Dika Mem. His older brother

games in seven seasons for the historic Bundesliga club, THW Kiel. With the German team, Palicka won the Champions league in 2010 and 2012 then the Superglobe in 2011. The Swedish goalkeeper moved to Danemark and joined Aalborg, where he played a season and won the national title, before returning to the German league, this time with the Rhein-Neckar Lowen

He received the same distinction one year later, at the 2019 world championship. In January 2020, he triumphed again with La Roja in the Euro final in Stockholm. Born in Paris, Mathieu Grébille moved to Martinique at the age of 7. He started playing handball, while at the same time becoming French junior vice-champion in high jump. He

joined the Montpellier training centre before taking part in his first professional match at the age of 18. In 2012, he made his debut for France. He won two major titles with Les Bleus, the 2014 European Championship and the 2015 World Championship. He joins Paris Saint-Germain, his second club in his career, after 12 years at the MHB.

After starting his professional career at Plock, where he was crowned Polish champion in 2011, Kamil Syprzak signed for Barcelona. He won 14 titles in four seasons with the Catalan club before joining Paris Saint-Germain Handball. With the Polish national team, he won the bronze medal at the 2015 World Championship, scoring his team's decisive extra-time goal against Spain. Last season, the Polish giant was elected best line player of Liqui Moly Starligue

After starting out as an amateur in his homeland, Kent Robin Tønnesen spent a season in Sweden with IK Sävehof. In 2013, he joined German club HSG Wetzlar for two years. The rightback then signed for Füsche Berlin. In the summer of 2017, the Norwegian international moved to Veszprém, where he stayed for four seasons and won a league title as well as two domestic cups. He continued his experience in Hungary for a further two years, signing for Pick Szeged

Jannick Green makes his professional debut in his native city, in Lemving (Denmark) at the age of 19. After joining Aalborg where he won the national championship in 2010 and Bjerringbro-Silkeborg, the goalkeeper flew to Germany and the SC Magdeburg. With the Scandinavian team, Green is Olympic champion (2016) and European champion (2019).

From the youth system of the FC Barcelona Handball, David Balaguer won three Spanish championships, two Spanish Supercups and one Copa del Rey with the Catalan club. After arriving in France in 2014 by joining HBC Nantes, the Spanish international won a French Cup and a Trophée des champions in 2017. The following year, he was crowned European champion with La Roja alongside his teammate who shares the right wing position in Paris,

Luka Karabatic played tennis at a high level during his teenage years. He chose handball at the age of 19, when he joined the Montpellier youth academy before turning pro and winning 14 titles with the MHB. After three seasons in Aix, he moved to Paris at the same time as his brother Nikola, in the summer of 2015. Twice named best defender in the Champions League, the new Paris captain added 11 trophies to his list of honours with the club from the capital. With France, he was European champion in 2014, world champion in 2015 and 2017 and Olympic champion in 2021. Luka Karabatic is Paris' captain since four seasons.

Jacob Holm's professional career began in 2013 with his hometown club Ribe-Esbjerg HH (Denmark). With this team, he played his first minutes in European competitions, during the 2017-2018 EHF European League campaign. Five seasons later, Jacob Holm moved to Germany and signed for Füchse Berlin. With the club from the German capital, he won the

Originally from Créteil, Yoann Gibelin joined his home-town club's youth academy at the age of 13 before turning professional four years later, in 2017. He scored 95 goals in 53 games for the club. With the France U18 team, the left-back achieved the double by winning the European Championship in 2016 and the World Championship a year later. At 18, he played for the France U21 team that was crowned World Champion in 2019, one year after being runner-up in the European Championship. He makes up the Rouge & Bleu left back

Nikola Karabatic signed for Paris Saint-Germain in the summer of 2015. With Montpellier, Kiel, Barcelona and Paris, the centre-back has won 19 championships in 20 seasons, but also 23 national cups, 10 national Super Cups, 3 Champions Leagues, 2 Super Globes and 1 European Super Cup. He is the record holder for French championship titles (14). With Les Bleus, he is triple Olympic champion, quadruple world champion and triple European champion. He was named three times best player in the world (2007, 2014 and 2016).

A youth product of US Ivry, Elohim Prandi joined USAM Nîmes Gard in 2017. He shone in national youth teams, winning the title at the U19 World Cup in 2017 and the U21 World Cup in 2019. A few months later, he made his full international debut before playing in his first major tournament, the 2020 European championship. At the end of the 2019-2020 season, he finished top scorer in his team with 94 goals and was elected best left-back in the Lidl

Star League. He also won the trophy for the most beautiful goal of the season.

He reconverted very quickly and became assistant coach of BM Ciudad Real in 2005. In 2014, he signs as head coach of RK Vardar Skopje, a position he held until 2018. With this club, he won three championships, four Macedonian cups and two SEHA leagues. Raul Gonzalez made a splash in 2017 by winning the Champions League against Paris. In 2018, he started a new challenge and became the coach of Paris-Saint-Germain where he met Luc Abalo, a player with whom he worked from 2008 to 2012 at BM Ciudad Real.

COACH

Raul Gonzalez arrived in the city of light with a reputation as a talented and experienced coach. In his first year with Paris Saint-Germain, he won the Lidl Starligue three games before the end of the championship, as well as the Coupe de la Lique. Despite a defeat in the quarterfinals of the Champions League, the club of the French capital achieved a record season: 26 points combined in group stage, a new record since the introduction of the new competition system.

During the 2020-2021 season, the Parisian coach won the Coupe de France before leading his team to a seventh consecutive Lidl Starlique title, a record in the history of the competition. The team finished on the third step of the podium at the Final 4 of the EHF Champions League.

STADE PIERRE-DE-COUBERTIN

The Stade Pierre-de-Coubertin was inaugurated in 1937 as part of the World Exhibition. Following the damage caused by the Second World War, it was rebuilt in 1946. The major renovation of this historic stadium is from 1990.

Paris Saint-Germain Handball is the resident club. The Club did some work to personalize the stadium, including the creation of a weight room, a medical room or the installation of Rouge et Bleu colored seats, similar to the Parc des Princes.

Some additional work was carried out during the Summer 2016 to allow Paris Saint-Germain Handball to host Champions League matches. Since the 2016-2017 season, all home games are held at Stade Pierre-de-Coubertin. During handball matches, the capacity is 3,500 spectators.

Paris Saint-Germain realized a 46-game winning streak in Lidl Starligue in Stade Pierre-de-Coubertin from the 08/06/2017 to the 25/04/2021) and also broke a record for a French team with 56 straight games without a loss in Coubertin, all competitions included (55 wins and 1 draw against Kiel on March 2018) between June 8th 2017 and December 1st 2019. And in Champions League, the team stayed unbeaten at home during more than 5 years, between November 2014 and December 2019. Paris lost only four times since games are played in Coubertin (60 games, 52 wins, 4 draws and 4 losses).

Beyond gamedays, the Stade Pierre-de-Coubertin is where daily practices of the professional team and club youth system take place.

Gare Montparnasse (5km) and Orly airport (25km) are the two national and international transport hubs close to the venue.

The Porte de Saint-Cloud stop on line 9 is the nearest station to the stadium, about 2 minutes' walk away. Metro line 9 runs through the centre of Paris on the north bank of the Seine, and is linked to several other lines in the Paris region network (1-6-7-8-10-13 on the west side and 2-4-5 on the east side).

The Porte de Saint Cloud stop, also a 2-minute walk from the venue, serves the following lines: 22-62-72-PC1-175-189-289. The Stade Pierre de Coubertin stop is served by line 189.



HISTORY

1941: The club was born in 1941 under the leadership of Christian Picard. At the beginning, the club's name was Patriots of Asnieres before taking the name of Asnieres Sports few years later.

1945: At the Parc des Princes, in front of 15 000 spectators, the team played its first Coupe de France final but lost against Villemomble. At this time, handball was still played with 11 players.

1987: The city of Paris agreed with the city of Asnieres to create a big handball club in the French capital. The team moved in Paris and took a new name: Paris-Racing-Asnières before changing once again for Paris-Asnières.

1989: Paris attracted one of the best player of handball, Jackson Richardson. He wore the parisian jersey between 1989 and 1991. At this period, another future World Champion, Patrick Cazal, signed his first professional contract with the club.



MAIRIE DE PARIS

1991/1992: The Paris Saint-Germain Omnisports, owned by Charles Biétry, has took control of the club called PSG-Asnières. Others sports section like volley-ball, rugby or boxing are launched by the Paris Saint-Germain.

<u>1995/1996</u>: Led by the 1995 World Champion and Olympic Games medalist Stéphane Stoecklin, the team finished 2nd of the French championship behind the OM-Vitrolles.

2000/2001: The Rouge & Bleu and Olivier Girault, winner of the World Cup few months before, lost against the Montpellier Handball during their first participation to the Coupe de France final.

2001/2002: A new chapter has been opened with Louis Nicollin, who stayed owner of the club until 2010.

2004/2005: Coached by Thierry Anti, the Rouge et Bleu ended the season at the 2^{nd} place of the French championship and qualified for the 2005-2006 Champions League, where they lost in the round of 16.

2006/2007: The club earned his first trophy by winning against Aix-en-Provence in the Coupe de France final.

2009/2010: Down in 2^{nd} division after the previous season, the team won the championship and moved back to 1st division.



2008-2009 squad

2011/2012: Qatar Sports Investments became the new owner of the club, which is named Paris Saint-Germain Handball. Under the impulse of Nasser Al-Khelaïfi, a new team is put in place.

2012/2013: The Paris Saint-Germain Handball, coached by the World Champion Philippe Gardent, won the French championship for the first time of its history. Some international stars were part of the team like Luc Abalo, Samuel Honrubia, Mikkel Hansen or Didier Dinart, which ended his career on this trophy.



2013/2014: With Daniel Narcisse, who joined the club at the beginning of the season, Paris reached the quarter-finals of the Champions League for the first time and won against Chambery in the final of the Coupe de France.

<u>2014/2015</u>: The Parisians fought until the last game with Montpellier to win their second French championship title. Stronger with the arrival of Thierry Omeyer, the Paris Saint-Germain Handball realized an historic triple crown after winning the Trophée des Champions and the Coupe de France.

2015/2016: The Paris Saint-Germain Handball, which host a new coach, Zvonimir Serdarušić, and the Karabatic brothers at the summer 2015, won one more time the Trophée des Champions and in Lidl Starligue. The team participated for the first time to the Final Four of the Champions League, proving the rise in power of the club at the European level.

2016/2017: Another triple crown with a third Trophée des Champions, a third consecutive Lidl Starligue and a first win in Coupe de la Ligue. The Ligue des Champions ended by a crual loss at the last second of the game in Final, against Skopje.

2017/2018: The Paris Saint-Germain Handball won for the first time Lidl Starligue - Coupe de France - Coupe de la Ligue. The Lidl Starligue title has been reached on the last week, which was also Daniel Narcisse last game, a true legend of French handball. In Champions league, Paris confirmed its power and qualified for Final4, where they ended at the third place.



2018/2019: Paris became national champion three games before the end of the Lidl Starligue. Eliminated in quarterfinals of Coupe de France against Montpellier, the Paris Saint-Germain Handball won one week after in Coupe de la Ligue for the third consecutive time. After breaking the record of points in Champions' League group phase, the Rouge & Bleu lost in quarterfinals against Kielce despite an incredible performance at the second leg in Coubertin. The end of season is marked by the retirement of the one of the best French handball player and best goalkeeper ever, Thierry Omeyer.



2019/2020: The Paris Saint-Germain Handball won the Trophée des Champions against Montpellier. During the match, Vincent Gérard, new Parisian player and former player of the Montpellier Handball, is named MVP with 17 stops. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Rouge & Bleu are crowned champions of Lidl Starligue in April after 18 matches.

2020/2021: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the LNH decides to cancel the Champions Trophy and the League Cup. The Rouge & Bleu achieved a historic start to the season by winning the first 22 days of Lidl Starligue. With 27 wins in 29 games, Paris won the French

champion, a few weeks after winning the fifth Coupe de France in its history against Montpellier (26-30).

<u>2021/2022</u>: Paris Saint-Germain realised the perfect season in Liqui Moly Starligue with 30 wins in 30 games. A performance never made in the five major team sports in France. Raul Gonzalez's men won, in June 2022, the third French cup of the club.

2022/2023: Raul Gonzalez players' won their tenth French championship (9 in a row) with 26 wins in 29 games. Luc Steins is crowned MVP for the third year in a row.
